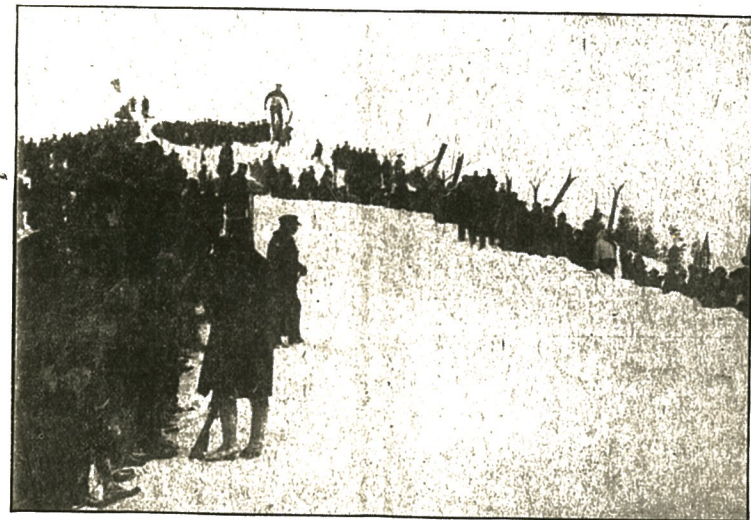

It is tournament day.
The skiers are contesting for the prizes on the hill as the Republican goes to press.
The weather is ideal for the occasion. The hill is in perfect condition and everything has conspired to make the tournament a splendid success.
Yesterday the Stoughton boys arrived and this morning's trains brought delegations from Ishpeming, Grand

Rapids, St. Paul and Ada, and every incoming train swelled the crowd. While from the country many more came in sleighs and sleds.

The morning broke clear and mild and the day is one of the pleasantest of the winter, which adds in great measure to the pleasure of the glad and grand event which Red Wing is holding. There are many holidays and sporting events in these strenuous days at the opening of the twentieth century, but among them all none are more unique and interesting than that of skiing. It is the national sport of Norway. When these sturdy folk came in such numbers to the Northwest, they not only brought with them to the new world their pluck, industry and thrift, which has done so much to transform this section from a wilderness to the most prosperous section of the globe, but they transplanted their inherent love of healthy and exciting sports.

Skiing found here a congenial home. The substantial winters with plenty of snow, some seasons, make this climate very agreeably fitted for the sport. It was the most natural thing in the world that Red Wing should be the place where skiing should first flourish in the Northwest. The sport needs three things to make it a success. A climate where snow abounds during the winter months, plenty of steep long hills and the Scandinavian. Nature contributed both the climate and the hills in generous measure and Norway has given to Minnesota and to this city, particularly, a lot of her stalwart sons. Not only were the original Norwegian Columbus's who first discovered this region handy with skis, but their descendants have maintained the prestige of his fathers in this peculiar but fascinating sport. It is said that the first thing that a Norwegian-American does as soon as he realizes that he is on earth to stay, is to look about and order his skis ready for use as soon as he can walk.

Many of the young boys can handle skis very dexterously and it is marvellous to witness those participate as they come down the steep long hill a thousand feet, in the well worn ski path. They go with the speed of the wind, and midway as they strike
