

George Pera

– 1950 United States FIS Team –

Born March 23, 1930 in Kingsford, Michigan, George Pera was the youngest of six children (Mauno, William, Victor, Martha, Mila, George) of Finnish immigrants Konsta and Hilma Pera. All spoke Finnish as a first language.

George began skiing at age 7, using skis Konsta fashioned for him from crib slats. Soon George was jumping competitively with the Red Wing junior club. When he was 13, he made his first jump on giant Pine Mountain, and at age 15 began competing for the Kiwanis Ski Club.



The post-World War II years saw logarithmic growth of interest in skiing in the Midwest, both competitive jumping and recreational downhill. The Iron Mountain – Kingsford area was a hub of that activity. Charter buses and special winter trains would bring aficionados by the thousands. The incredible Buck Erickson of the Iron Mountain News got the publicity out nationwide, and brought in all of the media networks and wire services.

During ski tournament week, lodging was booked for every available space within a hundred miles. It was common to have over 120 entries and well over 25,000 spectators at the tournaments.

These were exciting times – the fans followed their local favorites in the inter-club rivalries throughout the winter. Earlier dominance by the Bietila brothers of Ishpeming was being challenged by a new crop of young jumpers, particularly ones from the Iron Mountain – Kingsford area, but also by large contingents from Ishpeming, Ironwood, Duluth, Minneapolis, St. Paul, Chicago, Madison, Westby, Eau Claire, Colerain, and numerous smaller clubs.

With so many strong competitors, achieving and sustaining excellence was difficult, yet Pera became the first Kiwanis skier to be chosen to represent the United States on an Olympic or FIS team, setting a precedent for many local jumpers.



Following the 1950 season, George enlisted in the US Navy. He participated in limited competition in 1951. After discharge from the Navy in 1954 he joined the Kingsford Police Department, quickly rising to Chief. He married Eleanor, and they raised three daughters and a son. Upon his retirement from the police department, he worked for the United States Postal Service until retiring from there. For several more years he worked for UPCAP (Upper Peninsula Commission for Area Progress). He continues to be involved in a number of community service programs.
